arleston-based Hamiltons Removals are used to some unusual requests for their services. Pianos, pets, and plants present no problem. But if you go down to the beach at Dunwich as the sun is rising on Sunday 1st July, you can be sure of a big surprise! The car park will be teeming with 1,500 cyclists, and at least four of Hamiltons' biggest pantechnicons. For the 11th year running, Hamiltons will be packing and transporting over 700 bicycles back to London, from whence they departed the night before.

This is the annual Dunwich Dynamo cycle ride, which has taken place on a moonlit night in July since 1993. Hordes of riders pedal the 120 miles from Hackney in London to Dunwich in Suffolk, arriving from dawn onwards to breakfast on the beach, followed by a dip in the sea (maybe).

"We support the ride every year because it is so rewarding to help these cyclists who have made the effort to cycle through the night," says Hamiltons' chairman Brian Sawyer, who personally oversees the transportation. "We have a special technique for packing the bikes. The first row goes in forwards, the next with their handlebars in the opposite direction, and then they

are wrapped in cardboard, before loading the next row. These bikes are of immense value, in price and to their owners, and we want to pack them properly."

The transportation of cyclists and cycles is arranged by Southwark Cyclists.

"Most of us are regular, low tech commuters with a taste for adventure," says organiser Alex Crawford. "Many people say that doing this ride has changed their lives."
